After Shawn returned to Milwaukee he faced a number of challenges that included a period



Continuing his passion to support others, Shawn returned to school and received an Associate Degree in Theology from Agape Bible College. For many years he was also a dedicated volunteer as the President of the Back to School Festival at the MLK Center where they distributed over 20,000 backpacks to Milwaukee youth. In 2012, he showed his entrepreneurial side by starting and managing Team Levitate, an event planning company. Shawn continued his career when he became a Youth/Young Adult Community Organizer for the Milwaukee Innercity Congregations Allied for Hope (MICAH) where he focused on social justice leadership, building partnerships, and reducing incarceration in the 53206 zip code.

In May 2015, Shawn joined the Center for Self-Sufficiency as a Business Services Representative focusing on the promotion and marketing of CFSS Workforce Services to the employment community. As CFSS has grown and our needs have changed, Shawn has additionally contributed as both a Member Services Coordinator and a Workforce Ambassador. His recent efforts to recruit youth and young adults into the Face Forward program and coordinate their training needs are truly appreciated.
